

London Excel Bike Show February 2025

I was fortunate enough to win two tickets in the recent ESAM raffle for the show.

Surprisingly my wife Jackie said that she would like to come along which shoehorned nicely into her Valentine's Day gift(we went on 14th February). Parking at Hastings Station was £6 and the train tickets about £90.We boarded the train about 9.30am and arrived about 11.30am (same day). It was busy but comfortable in the hall. There were less manufacturers than when I last went but still plenty of new bikes from the usual suspects to look at. I sat on the 1000cc Hornet and the Tiger Sport 800cc. Couldn't touch the ground on either (b....r, f..k, s..t and damn). For me the Indian FTR still looks the best bike.





To me the BSA 650 Gold Star is an insult to the original and should have been called something else (like the tin star). Because it wasn't overcrowded the show was more enjoyable. Bike Wash Products

Scrolling on Facebook I see lots of adverts now but one that keeps popping up is HydroUK. The owner, Jordan, sprays his vehicle with a prewash, waits a few minutes then adds snow foam, another couple of minutes then a gentle jet wash or hose off.

The dirt just falls away. Yeah right I thought, anyways, a good introductory offer came up so I bought into it. My bikes usually go anywhere, except intentionally off road.... the point is they get dirty so I tried this pre wash and snow foam, I can honestly say, it works! The k1200s didn't need any brush agitation at all and that sat for 2 weeks before it got washed. The Multistrada Enduro (the one that's for off road but is too big and heavy for off road) that needed I little bit of extra washing on the swing arm around the chain entry, it's like a mat type finish so muck sticks into it. I personally will use it more for the dirty, wintery riding. It's not the cheapest out there on the market and it does use up the product quickly, especially while trying to set it up right. I like it and while I keep getting discount codes I'll buy my next batch of wash ready for the next dirty ride that I come home from.



Tight, crusty nuts 'n' bolts

Back in 2019 I bought a 2015 Ducati Multistrada 1200s, what a bike had a lot of fun on it but now it's getting tired and in need of some TLC after riding in all weathers. My wife now rides this but has allowed me to make the improvements I want, which is good. It currently has a flat rear tyre and the front has worn a bit unevenly so time to change them for something new, probably bt023's as I like those on the BMW I ride.

One of the improvements I really wanted to do is change the colour of the wheels, I really have a thing for the gold ones, I think with the white bike they set off well.

So powder coating.... I get the bike up on the centre stand, start the process of removing the front wheel. First thing is to remove the brake callipers, these are super tight against the wheel and the brake union, you need to prize the pads apart to gain room on the disk itself to then twist out. Now usually, I'll protect the paintwork with a layer or too of electrical tape, however, in my infinite wisdom I forgot this process. One side comes off ok but the harder side won't, the pistons are seized. I open the fluid reservoir, nothing. In just forcing it off, I lose a little bit knuckles and scratch the paint, in two places. I'm taking the opportunity while the wheels are being done to get a few other bits done too, luggage rails, centre and side stands and the exhaust heat shield, that will be cerakote.

I thought I'll get the rails and stands off then they can go with the wheels but no, the Italian has other plans, seized and chewed bolts from years of road grime, there not coming off in a rush.

I go back to the wheels to remove everything from the front, tyre valve, break disks, bearings and wheel weights, 10 bolts, 5 either side 3 get stuck and won't shift, the Torx head just chews the bolt.

My friend removed the tyres for me using a bit of kit called a Rabaconda, what a bit of kit that is too, manual but very good. He then gets his heat gun out and gently warms up the bolts and slowly releases them from the grip of way too much loctite

Well the wheels are delivered and I'm currently waiting on a couple of test swatches to decide the final colour. Next job is to free the rails from the clutches of the frame and get all the black stuff off to be coated too. Fingers crossed that goes a little better now that I've had to buy a battery powered heat gun.

(note from the editor. He's wanted to do this for years, says it's now my bike to ride but he still wants it for himself). Wayne F
